Seeking *comfort* is a natural human response to *difficulty*.

1. God comforts us with His presence and His power in our afflictions.

To comfort is to alleviate or lessen grief, sorrow, or *disappointment*.

Affliction: External distress or an inward *pressure* resulting from difficult *circumstances*.

Reasons God allows afflictions in our lives:

- **1.** Our afflictions are a means of sharing in the *sufferings* of Christ (v. 5).
- **2.** It teaches us to *trust* and depend upon God in ways that we rarely learn apart from suffering (v. 9).
- **3.** We are given comfort so we can *share* that comfort with others (vv.4-6).
- 2. God comforts us through one another in our afflictions.

Ways you can respond to others in their suffering:

- **1.** *Listen* well.
- **2.** Acknowledge the *difficulty* of the situation.
- **3.** Remind them of the *promises* of God.
- **4.** Be *present* with them.

5. *Pray* for them and with them.

Christine said that God's comfort lessens the blow of affliction and gives us power to face our difficulties. How have you experienced that in the past and/or are experiencing it now?

When you look back at the suffering and affliction you've experienced, how has God used that for your good and His glory?

Christine talked about the pattern of "God > me > we > God" in explaining how we experience and provide comfort. What did she mean?

Read 2 Corinthians 1:4. What did Paul mean when he said we comfort others through the comfort we receive from God? How have you experienced this in your life?

Review the five ways we can help comfort others in their suffering. Share an example of how you have both received and given comfort in one or two of these ways.



1. We're called to sacrificial service.

We give <u>all</u> for the one who gave all. This is the <u>service</u> we're called to.

The intersection of where our *affliction* and God's *comfort* meet quite often turns out to become our sacrificial service.

2. Adequacy for service comes from God.

Our confidence is the never changing *pleasure* of God in us because of Christ.

We don't have to make ourselves <u>strong</u> or overcome <u>weakness</u> in order to be used by God. We only have to be faithful <u>deliverers</u> of the message.

Why is our internal motivation to serve so integral to our service?


Why is it important to our sacrificial service that we remember we don't control outcomes?

Read 2 Corinthians 3:5-6. When was a time you tried to serve God out of your own competency and strength? What was the result?

Christine talked about getting the "but what abouts" when called to go and plant a church. What are your go-to "but what abouts" when God is calling you to ministry or service?

What does it look like practically to rest in the power of the Holy Spirit to accomplish God's work through you? What's keeping you from doing that?

- 1. The path of life is rocky.
- 2. A Christian who looks back with faith and forward with faith will remain steadfast.

How Can We Be Steadfast?

- **1.** Look back at how God has shown His *power* in the past.
- **2.** Look forward to the kind of *deliverance* He promises to come.

Read 2 Corinthians 4:16-18. How do we keep our focus on what is unseen rather than what is seen? What makes that hard to do?

How will continuing to look forward help you remain spiritually steadfast?







Ambassador: a diplomatic official sent to represent a <u>sovereign</u> or leader on a temporary *mission*.

Sincerity: holiness, purity, integrity, genuineness, authenticity; living in a way that aligns with the *message* and *demeanor* of Jesus.

1. God's ambassadors are sincere in motivations, relationships, and actions.

Three Important Markers for Ambassadors of Christ:

- **1.** Sincerity in *motivations*.
- **2.** Sincerity in *relationships*.
- **3.** Sincerity in *actions*.
- 2. God calls His ambassadors to increasing sincerity through repentance.


As God's ambassadors, we're to be sincere in motivations, relationships, and actions. Which of those three do you struggle to be sincere in the most? Why?

Christine said that when Paul was squeezed by the circumstances of life, what came out of him commended the truth of who God is and what He does. What comes out of you when life circumstances squeeze you?

What are some false teachings you've yoked yourself to in the past? What was the source? How can we stay alert to not fall to these kinds of falsehood?

Does repentance come easy for you? Explain. Share a refreshing moment in your life where repentance put you back on track with the Lord.

What are some ways you are currently pursuing holiness?







God's generosity toward us is the **source** of and the **motivation** for our generosity to others.

1. Generosity is an act of grace.

The Macedonians' Generosity:

- **1.** It was birthed in *poverty*.
- **2.** It was birthed in *suffering*.
- 3. It was marked by eagerness.
- **4.** It was prompted by *God*.

Anyone who puts their faith in Christ for salvation receives \underline{all} that belongs to Christ.

So this is God's grace—our <u>debt</u> is wiped away and we're given abundant <u>riches</u> in Christ that we could never earn or manufacture for ourselves.

2. Generosity is profitable for both the giver and the receiver.

Twofold Profit for the Giver:

- **1.** The giver gets to see the spiritual harvest benefit other people.
- **2.** The giver gets to profit in the joy of being a part of God's work.


What emotions or words do you associate with financial giving and why?

Read 2 Corinthians 8:1-5. What are your thoughts about the Macedonian churches when you hear their story? Are you amazed? Convicted? Inspired? How are they an example for all of us in our giving?

Share some moments in your life when God has been overly generous to you.

What does it mean to be a cheerful giver, and would you call yourself one? Why or why not?

We should always give trusting there will be spiritual harvest, but sometimes we're unable to physically see the results. However, there are times we can see tangible results of how God used our sacrificial giving for His purpose. Share some of those experiences.







Who or what we want to be associated with is often an indicator of what we most *value*, and what we most value drives us. It's what we *boast* in.

1. A fool boasts in and relies on her own strength.

Judaizers: Jews who professed to be *Christians* that taught that faith in Christ was not enough to save you. Instead, one must also keep the *law* in order to be right with God.

Four Things the False Teachers Boasted In:

- **1.** They boasted in their strong physical presence and their speaking skills.
- **2.** They boasted in their associations.
- **3.** They boasted in self-commendation.
- **4.** They boasted about their spiritual accomplishments.

2. A wise woman boasts in and relies on God's strength.

When we rely on God to come through for us is when we most clearly see and experience the *power* of God holding us, sustaining us, and helping us *endure*.

Whether God removes our thorn or whether God does not remove it, the truth is the same, God will be *more than enough* for us in it.

A fool boasts in and relies on her own strength, but a wise woman boasts in and relies on God's strength because it's in our *weakness* that God shows himself *strong*.


Why is a boastful spirit so detrimental to our walk with and witness for Christ?

Read 2 Corinthians 12:9-10. How do Paul's words in this passage sit with you? Are you able to make that same confession? If so, how? If not, what holds you back?

What makes it so difficult to admit weakness?

How has weakness and suffering been a catalyst to draw you closer to the Lord?







1. Paul invites the Corinthians to examine his heart.

Paul said the Corinthians should examine his:

Motives

Affections

Fears

How We Can Contribute to a Healthy Church Culture:

- **1.** Be a "there you are" *person* rather than a "here I am" *person*.
- **2.** Seek to *build* others up.
- **3.** Be more concerned with the spiritual *welfare* of others than in being proven *right*.

Confrontation isn't easy and it's something we should do *carefully* and *prayerfully*. If we're eager to do it, we're probably doing it wrong.

2. Paul exhorts the Corinthians to examine their own hearts.

Signs of Spiritual Maturity:

- **1.** Mature Christians *rejoice*.
- **2.** Mature Christians *encourage* or comfort one another.
- **3.** Mature Christians are of the same *mind*.
- **4.** Mature Christians live in *peace*.

How We Pursue Sanctification:

1. We cling closely to *God*.

2. We cling closely to God's *Word*.
