CONTEXT AND COMMENTARY FOR PERSONAL STUDY AND PREPARATION

(For age-appropriate language, use the Bible story on the following pages)

After God miraculously brought His people through on dry ground, He drowned Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and his riders in the Red Sea. (Exodus 14) God rescued His people in a way that no one could have imagined, and the people responded with fervent praise. They danced and sang with all their might, glorifying the God who rescued them. (Exodus 15:1-22)

Three days later, the worship service became a distant memory. The people had traveled through the desert without nding water. When they nally discovered water, it was undrinkable. Their victory song quickly turned into a cacophony of groans.

This pattern of forgetfulness would come to de ne the Israelites. When God provided for them, they responded with praise. As soon as things became di cult, they would rebel against Him. Over and over, the Lord patiently reminded the Israelites that rescuing them was His plan and that He would be the One to see them through to the promised land. All they had to do was believe Him and obey His commands. God then proved Himself by going over and above what they needed. Sometimes that looked like 12 springs and 70 date palms. Sometimes it looked like manna in the morning and quail at night. Sometimes it looked like a weekly day of complete rest for a people who had been cruelly forced to work their entire lives.

God made it clear that the Israelites did not have to do anything to earn His provision. His gracious gifts were freely available. When the people saw how God provided for them, they would know that He was the Lord. All God wanted from them was their trust.

Jesus said, "This is the work of God—that you believe in the one he has sent" (John 6:29). As you pray this week, thank God for providing everything you need for an abundant life. Praise Him for His faithfulness and the promise of eternal life for all who believe.



PRACTICE BIBLE SKILLS

- Choose two volunteers to sit in the chairs and instruct them to place their Bibles in their laps.
- Explain that you will give the two volunteers an Old Testament verse to look up in their Bibles. When someone nds the verse, he will stand up.
- The rst person to stand will read the verse, then sit back down to play again. The person who did not stand rst will choose a new person to sit in his chair. See who can stay for the most rounds!
- Use the following verse references: Exodus 14:4; Leviticus 19:18; Numbers 6:24; Deuteronomy 6:5; Joshua 1:5; Judges 6:12; 1 Samuel 17:47; 1 Chronicles 16:11; Psalm 55:16; Isaiah 6:8.

- » 2 chairs—Place the chairs in the front of the room.



MISSIONS EMPHASIS

- Show the "Surh Family Photo."
- Say: "Isaac and Hannah Surh, with the support of two other couples, started a new church in the Columbus area called Chroma, which means 'the intensity of color as it is illuminated by a light source.' They thought that name showed how important it is for people to show the light of Jesus and the good news about Him to others."
- Across their papers, lead kids to choose one color to write *Pray for Chroma*
- Direct kids to keep writing over the words with additional colors to provide a rainbow eff ct to the words.
- Suggest kids take their papers home to display as a reminder to pray for the church and its leaders who tell people about Jesus.
- Call on a volunteer to pray for the Surh family and Chroma church.



INTRODUCTORY ACTIVITY

- Ask kids to raise their hands if they like to eat.
- Show the food index cards and explain that diff rent foods are written on the cards. You will ask two volunteers to each pick a card. After they read what is on their cards, everyone else will choose which food they prefer by standing in front of the person holding that card.
- After each round, choose new volunteers to pick cards.
- Show the "Unit 1 Banner" and state that today kids will learn how God provided food and water for His people while they were in the wilderness. God's provision shows that God is loving and kind.

1. BIBLE STORY

- Guide kids to turn in their Bibles to Exodus 15 where the story is found.
- Before reading the Bible story, chose a volunteer to pray, thanking God for providing us with His Word.
- Open your Bible to Exodus 15 and tell the story.



2. REVIEW

- Show the Teaching Picture and ask if anyone learned something new from today's Bible story that they would like to share.
- Guide kids to choose a partner.
- Give each pair a piece of paper and a pencil.
- Challenge kids to work with their partners to read the "Unit 1, Session 3 Questions" then write the answers on their papers.
- After everyone has nished, review the answers together.
- Show the "Scripture Sketches" video.

3. LIFE ACTION

- Play "In nite (Psalm 147:5)" and invite kids to sing along or listen quietly to the words.
- Remind kids that God cared for the Israelites in the wilderness by providing food.
- Lead kids to name other things people need that God provides. (shelter, medicine, clothes, friends)
- If it wasn't mentioned, help kids understand that, because the punishment of sin is death, the greatest need all people have is the need for a Savior. All people sin and disobey God. But there is good news! God provided salvation from sin through the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus.
- Show "The Adventures of Dab and Derek" video.

4. UNIT VERSE

- Display the "Unit 1 Verse."
- Explain that you have hidden Bibles in the room. In the Bibles, you have hidden "Unit 1 Verse Cards" with parts of the Unit Verse.
- Challenge kids to nd all parts of the verse in the Bibles, then work together to put the verse in order.
- Say the verse aloud together.

REVIEW **OUESTIONS**

- » Why did the Israelites complain after a few weeks in the wilderness? (They complained about being hungry)
- » How did God provide meat for the Israelites? (He sent quail to their camp)
- » What did the people find each morning on the grounds of their camp? (fine fl es of bread that they called manna)
- » Except for the Sabbath, what happened when people gathered more manna than they needed? (It spoiled)
- » How long did God provide manna for the people to eat? (for 40 years)

OPTION: Teach the Weekly Bible Verse: Psalm 100:5.



CHOICE 1

- » Kids Activity Pages
- » pencils
- » large box of puffed rice cereal
- » plastic cups (1 per pair of kids)
- » plastic spoons (1 per person)
- » plastic tablecloth-Spread the tablecloth on the floor then pour the rice cereal all over the tablecloth.
- » timer
- » permanent marker

Teaching Tip: Display the "Allergy Alert" (Printables) letting parents know the kids will be exposed to puffed rice cereal

 - 6: "Animal Cards"-For a larger group, make copies so each person has a card.

□ CHOICE 1

Collect Manna

- Remind the kids that when the people needed food in the wilderness, God provided it.
- Invite everyone to stand around the tablecloth.
- Point out the puff d rice cereal and tell kids that the cereal is "manna."
- Group kids into pairs and give each pair a plastic cup.
- Give each person a plastic spoon.
- Explain that you will give everyone one minute to use their spoons to pick up the manna pieces and put them into their cups.
- When time is up, draw a line where the cereal reaches on each pair's cup to show who collected the most manna.
- State that God acted in powerful ways to give His people what they needed in the wilderness. Because He is kind and loved the Israelites, He sent quail in the evening and covered the ground with bread, called manna, in the morning. God did this for 40 years!
- Guide kids to complete "Bread Read" on their Kids Activity Pages to discover a message about God and allow volunteers to share the answer.
- Enlist a volunteer to read the blurb about manna on the activity pages.

□ CHOICE 2

Create a Habitat

- Give everyone a piece of white construction paper and an "Animal Card."
- Set out the glue, scissors, and markers.
- Direct each person to cut out the animal on her card and glue it in the middle of her piece of construction paper.
- Encourage kids to use markers to draw a habitat for their animals with everything they think the animals would need to survive.
- When everyone has nished creating habitats, give kids the opportunity to share their pictures.
- Invite a volunteer to read Matthew 6:26.
- State that God cares for all of His creation, but He especially takes care of His people. Just like He did for the Israelites in the wilderness, God loves and cares for people today and provides what we need to live.
- Guide kids to complete "Bread Read" on their Kids Activity Pages to discover a message about God and allow volunteers to share the answer.
- Enlist a volunteer to read the blurb about manna on the activity pages.



□ CHOICE 3

Count the Ways

- Guide kids to complete "Perfect Provisions" on their Kids Activity Pages and allow volunteers to share what they drew.
- Give everyone a piece of red construction paper and set out the markers and scissors.
- Direct kids to draw a large heart in the center of the paper.
- Remind kids that God provided what the Israelites needed in the wilderness. Through His provision, God showed He is loving and kind.
- Invite kids to think about the ways God has shown His love and kindness to them.
- Encourage kids to write a note of thanks to God on their hearts. Suggest they start by writing *Thank You, God, for* and II in the ways they see God's love.
- When they are nished writing, instruct kids to cut out their hearts.
- Display the hearts on a wall in the room.

□WRAP UP

- Invite kids to II in the last part of the sentence: "Thank You, God, for ..." by shouting one thing they are thankful to God for providing.
- Remind kids to take home their One Conversation pages and review them with their families.


Columbus, Ohio
