CONTEXT AND COMMENTARY FOR PERSONAL STUDY AND PREPARATION

After God miraculously brought His people through on dry ground, He drowned Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and his riders in the Red Sea. (Exodus 14) God rescued His people in a way that no one could have imagined, and the people responded with fervent praise. They danced and sang with all their might, glorifying the God who rescued them. (Exodus 15:1-22)

Three days later, the worship service became a distant memory. The people had traveled through the desert without nding water. When they nally discovered water, it was undrinkable. Their victory song quickly turned into a cacophony of groans.

This pattern of forgetfulness would come to de ne the Israelites. When God provided for them, they responded with praise. As soon as things became di cult, they would rebel against Him. Over and over, the Lord patiently reminded the Israelites that rescuing them was His plan and that He would be the One to see them through to the promised land. All they had to do was believe Him and obey His commands. God then proved Himself by going over and above what they needed. Sometimes that looked like 12 springs and 70 date palms. Sometimes it looked like manna in the morning and quail at night. Sometimes it looked like a weekly day of complete rest for a people who had been cruelly forced to work their entire lives.

God made it clear that the Israelites did not have to do anything to earn His provision. His gracious gifts were freely available. When the people saw how God provided for them, they would know that He was the Lord. All God wanted from them was their trust.

Jesus said, "This is the work of God—that you believe in the one he has sent" (John 6:29). As you pray this week, thank God for providing everything you need for an abundant life. Praise Him for His faithfulness and the promise of eternal life for all who believe.



PRACTICE BIBLE SKILLS

» No advance preparation or supplies needed.

- Say: "When we rst meet Jacob, he is in his mother's womb, wrestling with his brother, Esau, over who will be born rst. Jacob's name means deceitful—and it describes his early life well."
- Direct preteens to Genesis 27.
- State: "In Genesis 27 we learn how Jacob deceived his father, Isaac, into giving him Esau's birthright. But during an encounter with God, Jacob's heart was transformed. In Genesis 28, we learn how he vowed to serve God."
- Mention that God used Jacob to help carry out His plan to build the nation of Israel. Today the preteens will learn how God used Jacob's great-greatgrandson, Moses, to continue that plan.



MISSIONS EMPHASIS

- Show the "Surh Family Photo."
- Say: "Isaac and Hannah Surh, with the support of two other couples, started a new church in the Columbus area called Chroma, which means 'the intensity of color as it is illuminated by a light source.' They thought that name showed how important it is for people to show the light of Jesus and the good news about Him to others."
- Across their papers, lead preteens to choose one color to write *Pray for* Chroma church.
- Direct preteens to keep writing over the words with additional colors to provide a rainbow e ect to the words.
- Suggest preteens take their papers home to display as a reminder to pray for the church and its leaders who tell people about Jesus.
- Call on a volunteer to pray for the Surh family and Chroma church.

INTRODUCTORY ACTIVITY

- Ask preteens: "What is your favorite food?"
- State: "In this activity, you will share the name of your favorite food with your friends. Then, based on the rst letter of your favorite food, you will work together to line up in alphabetical order."
- Once preteens have lined up, ask them each to share the name of her favorite food aloud.
- Praise preteens for their e orts.
- Say: "In today's Bible story, the Israelites were grumbling to Moses about missing their favorite foods. What would Moses do? Let's nd out!"

1. GETTING TO THE POINT

- Say: "We catch up with the Israelites while they are living in the desert under Moses' leadership. They cannot nd water, and there is nowhere they can buy food. They begin to grumble to Moses about all the food they miss from Egypt."
- Ask (rhetorically): "How will Moses care for them?"
- State: "While Moses faced a big problem, he served a bigger God! Let's learn how God used Moses to provide for God's people."
- Show the "Scripture Sketches" video.


2. LOOK IN THE BOOK

- Ask: "Did you know your body is made mostly of water—not 20 or even 40, but 60 percent? If you go without water for even a day, you can grow dizzy and feverish. After a few days without water, you can even die!"
- Direct preteens attention to Exodus 15:22.
- Ask: "According to this passage, how long had Moses and the Israelites been in the desert?" (3 days) "What were they unable to nd?" (water)
- Say: "Moses knew the people needed water. He knew he was facing a big problem, and he knew it was a problem that only God could solve."
- State: "Let's imagine what it was like to watch God provide that day."
- Distribute a "Miracle Manna" script to each preteen. Tell preteens the script is from Exodus 15:22–16:36. Assign roles accordingly.
- Allow preteens 5 minutes to prepare.
- Enact the script, then praise preteens for their e orts.
- Say: "When the Israelites needed food and water in the wilderness, God provided. He acted in powerful ways to give them what they needed. God provided for all people's greatest need by sending His Son, Jesus, to be the Savior."
- Ask: "Do you know what it means for Jesus to be your Savior?"
- Use "Sharing the Gospel with Kids" (page 5) to share the gospel and help preteens know how to respond when prompted by the Holy Spirit to receive the gift of Jesus.
- State: "If you are ready to admit that you are a sinner, believe that Jesus is God's Son, and confess that Jesus is your Savior and Lord, let me or one of your other leaders know. Receiving Jesus as your Savior is the most important decision you will ever make."

3. REVIEW CHALLENGE

- Direct attention to the "What's Happening?" cube. Point out the directions on each of the cube's sides.
- Ask a volunteer to roll the cube. When it stops rolling, ask the volunteer
 to respond to the statement that is faceup. Direct preteens to refer to the
 teaching picture for help in responding.
- Keep playing until all preteens have rolled the cube and responded.





- Ensure you have covered all the information from the review questions in the sidebar.
- Say: "In today's Bible story, we learned how God provided for the people of Israel. Just as He did for the Israelites, God shows His love and care for us today. God shows concern and care for all people, no matter their status, race, or ethnicity."
- Lead preteens to sing "No One Like You."

4. UNIT VERSE CHALLENGE

- Direct preteens to the "Unit 1 Verse" and lead them in reading it aloud.
- Instruct preteens to form a wide circle, allowing about two feet between each person.
- Give one preteen a ball.
- Say: "In this challenge, we will see how well we know our verse! We will time ourselves as we recite it."
- Explain the challenge rules: On "Go," the person holding the ball will bounce it to another preteen. The preteen catching the ball will recite the rst word of the verse, then bounce the ball to another preteen, who will then recite the second word of the verse.
- Continue play until preteens recite the entire verse.
- Begin play and start the timer. Encourage preteens to bounce the ball to others who have not yet had a turn. After they completely recite the verse, stop the timer. Share their time and praise all e orts!
- Repeat the challenge as time allows. Encourage preteens to beat their previous times.

5. APPLY THE BIBLE AND PRAY

- Show "The Adventures of Dab and Derek" video.
- Point out the "Unit 1 Banner" and state: "Our God is great for many reasons. In the last session and today, we have studied two more reasons: 1) God is all-powerful, and 2) God is loving and kind."
- Direct preteens' attention to the "No One Like God" mobile. Guide volunteers to write the two reasons noted above on two message banners. (The mobile should already be assembled from prior use.)
- Ask a volunteer to read the phrases aloud.
- Say: "Because God is all-powerful, loving, and kind, He worked in mighty ways to provide the Israelites the food and water they needed. God still works in mighty ways to provide for people today. We will talk about some of those ways in our next activity."
- Pray with preteens, then dismiss them to Live It Out groups.

REVIEW **OUESTIONS**

- » What food did God provide the Israelites in the morning? (manna)
- » What food did God provide the Israelites in the evening? (quail)
- » Why did God instruct the Israelites to collect enough manna for only one day? (He wanted them to trust Him to provide food daily)
- » What happened if the Israelites collected extra manna? (It spoiled)
- » Why did God instruct the Israelites to collect manna for two days on Day 6? (Manna wouldn't fall on the Sabbath since it was a day of rest)
- » How did God provide for people's greatest need? (God sent Jesus to be people's Savior)

Create a Quail Craft Plaque

- Say: "God showed His concern and care for the Israelites by providing them food and water. He acted in powerful ways, sending quail to cover their camp in the evening."
- State: "Today God is still faithful to provide for people. We will make a plaque to remind us of God's care for us."
- Distribute four craft sticks and a copy of "Quail Craft" to each preteen.
- Set out the colored pencils, scissors, and glue.
- Instruct preteens to cut out all the "Quail Craft" pieces.
- To assemble the plaque, refer to the instructions on the pack item.
- Praise preteens for their e orts.
- Say: "God also provided for the Israelites by sending them manna. He instructed them to collect an omer for each person."
- Ask: "What's an omer? Let's nd out!"
- Encourage kids to work in pairs to complete "What's an Omer?" and "Always Good" on their Kids Activity Pages.
- When nished, allow volunteers to share the answer and what they drew.
- State: "God continues to provide for people today. He shows concern and care for all people—no matter their status, race, or ethnicity."

□ CHOICE 2

Play a Food Guessing Game

- Say: "Earlier you named some of your favorite foods. Now let's see how good you are at drawing them!"
- Form two teams and select a preteen to begin.
- Allow a preteen to draw a "Food Guessing Game Card" from the basket.
- Direct the preteen to the board and give her a marker.
- Allow her one minute to sketch the food named.
- Ask her teammates to identify the food she has drawn. If they identify it correctly within a minute, award her team 10,000 points. If they cannot identify it, award no points, and share the food's name.
- Alternate teams and preteens. Repeat the process.
- Congratulate the team with the most points.
- State: "When the Israelites needed food, God provided. He sent them manna and instructed them to collect an omer for each person."
- Ask: "What's an omer? Let's nd out!"
- Encourage kids to work in pairs to complete "What's an Omer?" and "Always Good" on their Kids Activity Pages.
- When nished, allow volunteers to share the answer and what they drew.
- Say: "God continues to provide for people today. He shows concern and care for all people—no matter their status, race, or ethnicity."



□ CHOICE 3

Play "God Provides" Board Game

- Ask: "Have you ever thought about the many ways God provides for people? Let's look at a few ways now."
- Form two teams and give each team a penny. Instruct one team to use the penny heads-up, and the other to use it tails-up.
- Lead each team to place its penny on the start space of "God Provides."
- Determine which team begins with a coin toss.
- Direct the winning team to select a player. Instruct this player to roll the dice and move the penny two spaces when the dice lands on an even number and three spaces for an odd number.
 - -If a player lands on a space that describes a way God provides for people, direct the player to read the description aloud.
 - -If the player lands on a space with a game instruction, direct the player to complete the instruction.
- Alternate teams and players, giving all a turn.
- Congratulate the team that nishes rst.
- Say: "When the Israelites needed food, God provided. He sent them manna and instructed them to collect an omer for each person."
- Ask: "What's an omer? Let's nd out!"
- Encourage kids to work in pairs to complete "What's an Omer?" and "Always Good" on their Kids Activity Pages.
- When nished, allow volunteers to share the answer and what they drew.
- Say: "God continues to provide for people today. He shows concern and care for all people—no matter their status, race, or ethnicity."

□ WRAP UP

- Say: "When the Israelites needed food and water in the wilderness, God provided. He acted in powerful ways to give the people what they needed. God provides for people's greatest need by sending His Son, Jesus, to be the Savior."
- Remind preteens that since the time of Adam and Eve, every person has sinned. People's sin separates them from God and leads to physical and spiritual death.
- State: "But God provides a way for people to be rescued from sin through Jesus. God sent Jesus to live a perfect life and then take the punishment people deserve, dying on the cross in their place. God then raised Jesus from the dead. Through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, God provides a way to rescue people from sin and adopt them into His family."
- Pray, thanking God for providing a way we can be rescued from sin.
- Remind kids to take home their One Conversation pages and review them with their families.





God Provided for the People

EXODUS 15:22-16:36

The Israelite people had been away from Egypt for only a few weeks. It was the fifteenth day of their second month. (Exodus 16:1) Instead of remembering how God had cared for them, they complained about how hungry they were! "In Egypt we had all the bread and meat we wanted," they told Moses. "Instead,



you brought us out here in the wilderness where we will die of hunger!" God told Moses, "I will rain down bread from heaven. The people will gather bread every day, but they must follow My instructions."

Moses and Aaron told the people, "God has heard your complaining. He will give you meat to eat this evening and all the bread you want in the morning. Then you will know that He is your God!"

Sure enough, that evening, quail came and covered the camp. In the morning, a heavy coat of dew covered the camp. When the dew was gone, fine flakes covered the ground, like frost. The Israelites asked each other, "What is it?"

Moses answered, "This is the bread God has given you to eat. You may gather two quarts for every person in your tent." Everyone had enough to eat. Moses warned, "Don't leave any until morning." When people stored more than they needed, the bread spoiled with worms and smelled bad. On the sixth day, the people gathered twice as much to have enough for the Sabbath day. 




Assembly Instructions See the example. 1 Cut out the title banner and 5 message blocks. 2 Punch holes as indicated. 3 Center a paint stir stick on the top back of title banner as shown. Glue the stick to the back of the banner. ④ Tie 24-inch yarn to each end of the stick to form a hanger. Trim ends as needed. (5) String 5-inch yarn through the bottom hole of each message block. 










Bible Studies for Life Preteens Leader Pack FALL 2025 **GOD:** (in a booming voice) Moses, tell the people they will eat meat at twilight and bread in the morning. Then you will all know that I am the Lord your God!

NARRATOR: Just as God promised, He sent quail in the evening. In the morning, He sent a white, aky substance—something like coriander seed that tasted like honey wafers.

GOD: (tosses paper airplanes onto the oor to simulate quail being sent to the camp)

PEOPLE

OF ISRAEL: (picks up quail)

GOD: (tosses popcorn onto the oor to simulate bread being sent to the camp)

ISRAELITE 1: (quizzically) What is this white stu?

MOSES: (joyfully) This is the bread God has given you. Pick up as much as you need to eat for this day only. Boil and bake what you need, but do not keep any leftovers.

NARRATOR: But some people kept bread overnight. The next morning, it was a stinky mess!

ISRAELITE 2: (with a wrinkled nose) Eeew! What's that smell? Is that the bread?

ISRAELITE 3: (gagging and pointing at the bread)

Yuck! It is! And it's full of maggots!

NARRATOR: The people learned their lesson!

Moses then gave them more special instructions



MOSES: God says since day seven is the holy Sabbath, the day of rest, no bread will fall that day. To make sure we have enough to eat, He has commanded us to collect twice as much on day six. He has promised the bread collected on day six will last through day seven.

NARRATOR: But not everyone obeyed God's instructions. Some didn't collect extra bread on day six. When they came out to collect it on day seven, they found none.

will people refuse to keep My commandments and laws? I have said I will give you extra manna on day six. On day seven, you are to rest.

NARRATOR: The people listened to God and rested on day seven. He gave Moses more instructions to make sure the people remembered His faithfulness.

MOSES: God has commanded us to keep an omer of the bread—called manna—so that future generations will be reminded of God's faithfulness in the wilderness. Aaron, take an omer of manna, put it in a jar, and place it before God in the ark of the covenant.

AARON: (takes a piece of manna [popcorn] and places it in a jar, then puts the jar in the box)

NARRATOR: Aaron obeyed, and the people were reminded of God's faithfulness.

For 40 years in the wilderness, God showed the people how He loved and cared for them. Today God still loves and cares for people. He helps us have what we need to live.






