CONTEXT AND COMMENTARY FOR PERSONAL STUDY AND PREPARATION

(For age-appropriate language, use the Bible story on the following pages)

When Moses met with God at Mount Sinai, it was not the rst time. Most scholars agree that Mount Sinai and Mount Horeb were the same place, the mountain where Moses initially encountered God in the form of a burning bush. (Exodus 3) At that time, God gave Moses a sign so he and the Israelites would know that God was the One responsible for their freedom. "When you bring the people out of Egypt, you will all worship God at this mountain." (Exodus 3:12)

When Moses brought the people to Mount Sinai, it was the ful Ilment of God's promise to rescue His people. God promised Moses He would bless the people mightily if they would only listen to Him and obey His commands. God promised to make the Israelites a kingdom of priests and a holy nation. The priest's job was to mediate between a holy God and an unholy people, to serve God, and to teach His ways. By making Israel a kingdom of priests, they were to represent God to the nations and teach them His ways. Before they could do that, they must rst know more about the God they were to serve.

Before giving the Law, God repeatedly warned the Israelites not to step foot on the mountain lest they die. These warnings were not oppressive restrictions on their freedom. They were acts of mercy. The Israelites needed to know their God was not like any of the gods they had ever heard about. He was holy and set apart. He alone was to be worshiped. They had to eradicate idolatry from their midst. They were to treat God's name as holy and demonstrate reverence and honor for God by honoring their earthly parents. They were to show love by respecting each other's lives, marriages, property, reputations, and possessions. God's heart was to dwell with His chosen people. He told them what they must do to pursue holiness so they could be in His presence.

When God gives commands, they are always for the good of His children. As you pray this week, thank God for giving you His Word so you may know His character and respond in faith and obedience. Ask Him to help you represent Him well to an unbelieving world.



PRACTICE BIBLE SKILLS

- Lead kids to form two teams. Provide every child with a Bible book card.
- Explain that on your cue to begin, team members will race one at a time from the Start line to drop their cards into the Old Testament bag or the New Testament bag, depending on which testament the book on the card belongs.
- Announce the team to complete the relay rst as winner, but play until all the kids on both teams deposit their cards into a bag.
- Conclude by retrieving the cards and reading the Bible book names aloud. Invite the group to help you determine if the cards were placed in the correct bag.

MISSIONS EMPHASIS

- Call the kids' attention to the "US Map," "Aaron Taylor Photos," and "Surh Family Photo."
- Remind the kids that Columbus has a large population of diverse people and is home to Ohio State University, which is one of the largest university campuses in the United States.
- Give each child a foam pennant. Set out markers and foam shapes.
- Lead kids to write *Pray for Ohio* in the center of the pennant.
- Invite kids to use the foam shapes to decorate their pennants.
- Close by inviting the kids to hold their pennants as they pray for churches and missionaries who are telling people in Columbus, Ohio, the good news about Jesus.

INTRODUCTORY ACTIVITY

- Give an index card to each child. Instruct kids to imagine they could make up one rule that everyone would have to follow. Direct the kids to each write a rule on their index cards.
- Collect the cards. Read the cards aloud and invite boys and girls to guess who made up each rule. After a few guesses, prompt the author to identify herself.
- Follow up by asking: "Are rules good or bad? What makes a rule good?" (Pause for kids to respond)
- Teach that God gave us rules to show that He is holy. Encourage kids to listen for rules or commandments in the Bible story that show God's people how to live.

- » Printables: "Books of the Bible Cards"
- » 2 Small paper bags, marker, scissors
- » Write Old Testament on 1 paper bag and New Testament on the other bag. Place the bags near each other on 1 side of the room.
- » Cut apart the Bible book cards, scrambling the order of the cards.
- » Printables: "Unit 1 Missions: Columbus, Ohio" "US Map" "Aaron Taylor Photos" "Surh Family Photo"
- » Large sheets of craft foam, scissors, markers, self-adhesive craft foam shapes
- » Cut the sheets of craft foam in half diagonally to make a pennant shape (1 per person).
- » Index cards, pencils
- » Option: "God Gave the Ten Commandments" coloring page (Printables)



- » Use the unit banner rectangle for Session 4 that reads holy Display the "Ten Commandments" poster on a focal wall.

1. TELL THE BIBLE STORY

Direct kids' attention to the "Unit 1 Banner."
 Invite a few child volunteers to read aloud the characteristics of God from the rst three sessions.
 (all-knowing and in control of all things, powerful, loving and kind)



- Explain that today kids will learn that God is holy. Add the title that reads holy to a blank space on the banner.
- Invite a few volunteers to tell their ideas about what the word holy
 means. Emphasize that because God is holy, or perfectly good, pure and
 righteous, He is totally unique. There is no one like God.
- Teach that God deserves our worship, respect, and obedience, and He gave us rules or commandments to show us how to worship and obey Him.
- Point out the "Ten Commandments" poster. Encourage kids to listen carefully for the part in the story when you invite them to say the commandments from the poster aloud with you.
- Open your Bible to Exodus 19–20 and tell the Bible story in your own words. Option: Show the "Scripture Sketches" video.

Bible Story: God Gave the Ten Commandments

Three months after the Israelites escaped from Egypt, they came to the Sinai Wilderness. They camped near the bottom of a large mountain called Mount Sinai. BASED ON EXODUS 19-20; 31:18; DEUTERONOMY 5:1-21

2. EXPLORE THE CHRIST CONNECTION

- Admit to the group that you have not followed all of God's commandments perfectly. Ask boys and girls to acknowledge if they have also broken some of God's commands.
- Emphasize that all people sin, or disobey God. Because God is holy, our sin keeps us away from Him. Jesus is holy and never sinned. He died so our sins can be forgiven. When we trust Jesus to forgive our sin we will no longer be separated from God.

SHOW "THE ADVENTURES OF DAB AND DEREK" VIDEO.

3. PRACTICE THE UNIT VERSE

- Lead kids in reading the Unit Verse, Psalm 147:5, aloud with you. Prompt kids to say the verse aloud again, but this time challenge them to close their eyes during whatever portion of the verse they have memorized.
- Provide time for kids who have the entire verse memorized to recite it aloud for the group individually or with a friend. Praise everyone for working to learn the Unit Verse during this unit.

4. SING AND PRAY

- Remind the group that God is holy and deserves our worship. Sing "No One Like You" together.
- Continue to worship by opening your Bible to the Weekly Verse, 1 Samuel 2:2, and reading the verse aloud as a prayer.

- » What did God promise if His people obeyed Him? (honor them, make them a holy nation)
- » What did the people say when asked if they would obey God? (They agreed to obey)
- » True or False: The people could hear when God spoke to Moses. (true)
- » What happened when God appeared to Moses? (loud trumpet sound, thunder, lightning, smoke, mountain shook)
- » What did God use to write the Ten Commandments? (His own finger
- » How does God want people to honor Him? (Commandments 1–4)
- » What are some ways God wants people to respect others? (Commandments 5–10)

LIVE IT OUT

CHOICE 1

- » Kids Activity Pages
- » Pack Item:
- 3: "Unit 1 Questions"
- » Tape, small paper plates in 2 colors (18 of each color)
- » Separate the "Unit 1 Questions" for Session 4.
- Use tape to create

 a grid of 6 rows and
 6 columns on the floo.

 Each block in the grid must be large enough to fit a plat.
- » Option: Use colored paper or note cards.

CHOICE 2

- » Kids Activity Pages
- » Pack Item:
 11: "Set Apart Cards "
- » Scissors
- » Cut apart the cards. Make separate piles with the 4 cards in each set.

CHOICE 1

FOUR IN A ROW REVIEW

- Distribute Kids Activity Pages and instruct the boys and girls to complete the activities.
- Lead kids to form two teams. Assign each team a color and provide every child a plate that corresponds to his team's color.
- Direct kids' attention to the grid on the oor. Explain that the goal of the game is to be the rst team to form a horizontal, vertical, or diagonal line with four plates of the team's color.
- Explain that you will alternate asking kids on each team a review question. The child who answers a question will be invited to place his plate inside an open space on the grid.
- Alternate asking teams questions using the review questions for this session, along with some you create on your own. You may challenge kids by using review questions from Sessions 1–3 of Unit 1, allowing kids on a team to work together to answer questions from previous sessions.
- Announce the rst team to line up four plates in a row as the winner.

CHOICE 2

ONE IS NOT LIKE THE OTHERS

- Provide boys and girls with Kids Activity Pages and direct them to complete the activities.
- Lay the four cards in Set 1 faceup in random order. Explain that three of the
 cards have something in common; however, one card is di erent from the
 others. Lead kids to discuss how the items pictured are alike and what is
 di erent about one item. Prompt them to decide as a group which card is
 not like the others.
- Flip over the card that does not belong to reveal the letter on the back. Remove the other cards and display the letter in a separate area. Repeat the activity with the cards in Sets 2 through 8.
- Draw kids' attention to the words created by the lettered cards: set apart
- Teach that God gave us the Ten Commandments to show that He is holy, or set apart. God's character is totally unique and separate from what He created.
- Explain that obeying God's commands sets people apart. It makes them di erent from those around them and shows others that they belong to a holy God.
- **Option:** Challenge older kids by playing the sets of cards in random order so that kids have to unscramble the letters to *set apart* after all the sets have been played.



CHOICE 3

FINGER PAINTING FUN

- Ask: "What did God write on two tablets with His own nger?" (the Ten Commandments)
- Remind the group that God gave us rules, such as the Ten Commandments, to show that He is holy. No one is perfect and holy like God; therefore, no one can keep God's rules perfectly. For that reason, God sent Jesus, who is holy, to forgive our sin and bring us back to Him.
- Provide boys and girls with craft paper and washable nger paints. Invite kids to use their ngers to paint the word holy in large letters onto their craft papers. Suggest they make the word colorful and add creative designs around it.
- When kids nish their artwork, assist them in cleaning their hands with the wipes you have provided. While the paint dries, lead the group to complete the activities on the Kids Activity Pages.
- Close by encouraging boys and girls to take their nger painting art home and tell everything they can remember about the Bible story to someone in their homes.
- Teaching Tip: Children with sensory sensitivities may prefer completing this activity with a paintbrush.

WRAP UP

Close It Out

- Show the teaching picture. Point out the stone tablets. Ask child volunteers to name things that happened in the Bible story before God gave Moses two stone tablets with the Ten Commandments. Answers might include: Moses went to the top of Mount Sinai; Moses reminded the people that God rescued them; the people agreed to obey God; God spoke through a thick cloud; the people cleansed themselves; thunder rumbled; lightning ashed; a ram's horn (trumpet) sounded; God appeared in a fi e
- Sing "In nite."
- Praise the group for learning that God is holy. Encourage kids to bring their One Conversation pages home to talk about what they learned with a parent.


Columbus, Ohio
